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Abstract

This document is a printable version of Dashboard help.

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Introduction to Dashboard

Dashboard is a tool that allows your organization to create performance dashboards from multiple sources, based on criteria you specify, for more relevant business analytics. Once created, the dashboard provides a customized view into the collections data associated to a Latitude user account based on the user's assigned role. It displays real-time performance metrics so collectors and managers can analyze collection and performance results. You can customize the Dashboard to suit your personal preferences.

Depending on your permission, the tasks you can do in Dashboard include:

- Adding, modifying, configuring, and deleting dashboards
- Adding, modifying, arranging, configuring, and removing dashboard gadgets
- Adding, modifying, and removing data sources
- Assigning data sources to gadgets


Log On to Dashboard

Use the **Enter Your User Name and Password** dialog box to log on to Dashboard. Your assigned permissions determine which options and features in Dashboard are available to you. For more information, see *Permissions and Policies* in the Latitude documentation.

To log on to Dashboard

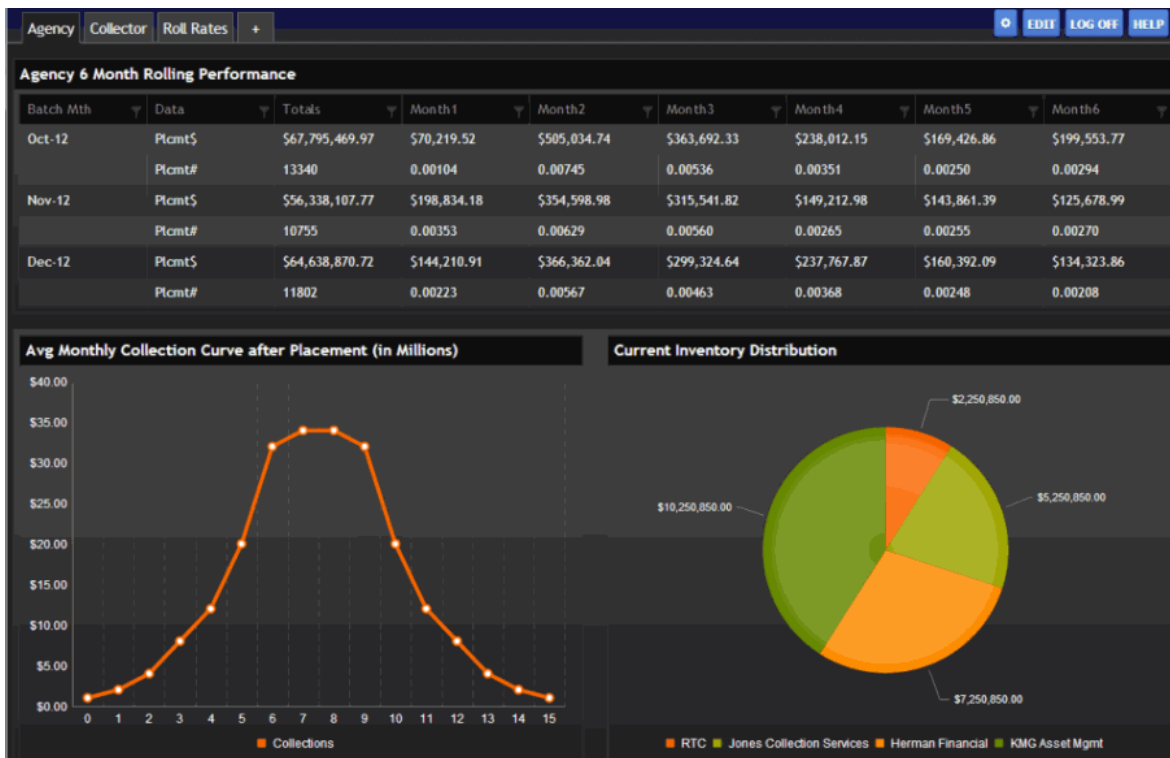
1. Do one of the following:
 - On your desktop, click the shortcut to Dashboard.
 - In your browser, if you have a bookmark set for Dashboard, click the bookmark.
 - In your browser, in the **Address** box, type the URL address for Dashboard and press **Enter**.
 - If your organization configured the Welcome Web Page permission in the **Permissions and Policies Editor** to display the Dashboard when logging on to Latitude, log on to Latitude.

The **Enter Your User Name and Password** dialog box appears.



2. In the **User Name** box, type your Dashboard user name.
3. In the **Password** box, type your Dashboard password. As you type your password, periods display instead of the typed characters.

4. To have the system remember your user name so you don't have to type it each time you log on, select the **Remember me** check box.
5. Click **Logon**. Dashboard appears.



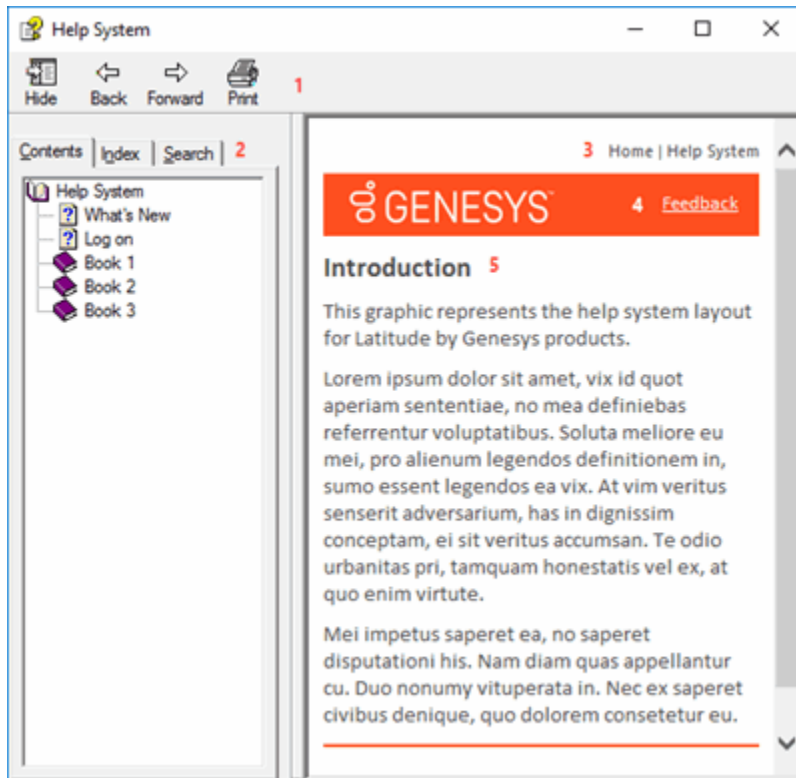
Note: The dashboard that appears is based on the default dashboard defined in the **Permissions and Policies Editor** in Latitude.

Help Overview

Dashboard help provides you with information for using Dashboard. You can click the **Help** link in the **Application** toolbar to display the table of contents. You can locate and view any topic using the table of contents, index, and search features.

To open help

In the Dashboard toolbar, click **Help**. The **Dashboard Help** window appears.



Tip: To adjust the width and height of the window or its panes, click the edge of the window or pane and drag it up or down, left or right.

1. **Toolbar:** Allows you to display the table of contents, index, or search feature. When you click an option in the toolbar, the corresponding information appears in the **Navigation** pane.
2. **Navigation pane:** Displays the following:
 - Contents:** Displays the table of contents. To display a topic in the **Content** pane, expand a book and then click the link.
 - Index:** Displays the index. To display a topic in the **Content** pane, type a keyword or phrase in the box (or scroll through the list) and then click the link in the list.
 - Search:** Displays the [search feature](#). To display a topic in the **Content** pane, type a keyword or phrase in the box and then press **Enter**. In the search results, click the link.
 - Glossary:** If available, displays a list of terms and their definitions. To display a definition, click the term.
3. **Breadcrumbs:** Displays your current location within the help system. When you click a breadcrumb, the related topic displays.
4. **Content toolbar:** Displays an option to send feedback through an email message to Latitude by Genesys Documentation.
5. **Content pane:** Displays the contents of a topic. To display recently visited topics, use your browser's **Back** and **Forward** options. To view the **Content** pane menu, right-click in the **Content** pane.

Search feature

You can use the search feature to search for topics that contain words or phrases that you specify. You formulate a search query following a specific [set of rules](#). You can include [wildcard expressions](#), [Boolean operators](#), and [nested expressions](#) in your search query. A list of topics that match your search criteria appear in the search results. When you click a topic title in the search results, the content of that topic appears in the **Content** pane.

Search syntax

The basic rules for formulating search queries are:

- Searches are not case-sensitive, meaning you can type uppercase or lowercase characters.
- You cannot search for a single character or the following reserved words: an, and, as, at, be, but, by, do, for, from, have, he, in, it, not, of, on, or, she, that, the, there, they, this, to, we, which, with, you.
- The search engine ignores punctuation marks and special characters such as @#\$%^&()=+[]\.
- Enclose phrases and terms that include a period (such as a file name with an extension) in double quotation marks.

Wildcard expressions

Wildcard expressions allow you to search for one or more characters using a question mark or asterisk. A question mark represents a single character, while an asterisk represents one or more characters.

Search for...	Example	Result
Topics with text that starts with one or more specified characters and ends in any character or number of characters	log or log*	Returns all topics with text that starts with the specified characters (for example, log, logon, logging.)
Topics with text that starts with the specified characters, has a single character that can be anything, and ends in the specified characters	32?57	Returns all topics with text that has any character where you placed a question mark (for example, 32?57 returns 32257, 32457, and 32857.)
Topics that contain all the words specified, in any order or placement within the topic	account status	Returns all topics with both account and status, but not necessarily as a phrase or in the order specified. For example, the search returns topics with "the account status..." or "the status of the account..."
Topics that contain the specified phrase	"account status"	Returns all topics with account status as a phrase. For example, the search returns topics with "the account status..." but not "the status of the account..."

Boolean operators

Boolean operators (AND, OR, NOT, NEAR) allow you to create a relationship between terms. If you don't specify an operator, the system uses AND by default.

Search for...	Example	Result
AND	account AND status	Returns all topics with both account and status, but not necessarily as a phrase or in the order specified. For example, the search returns topics with "the account status..." or "the status of the account..."
OR	account OR status	Returns all topics with either account or status, or both.
NOT	account NOT status	Returns all topics with account but not status.
NEAR	account NEAR status	Returns all topics where account is within eight words of status.

Nested expressions

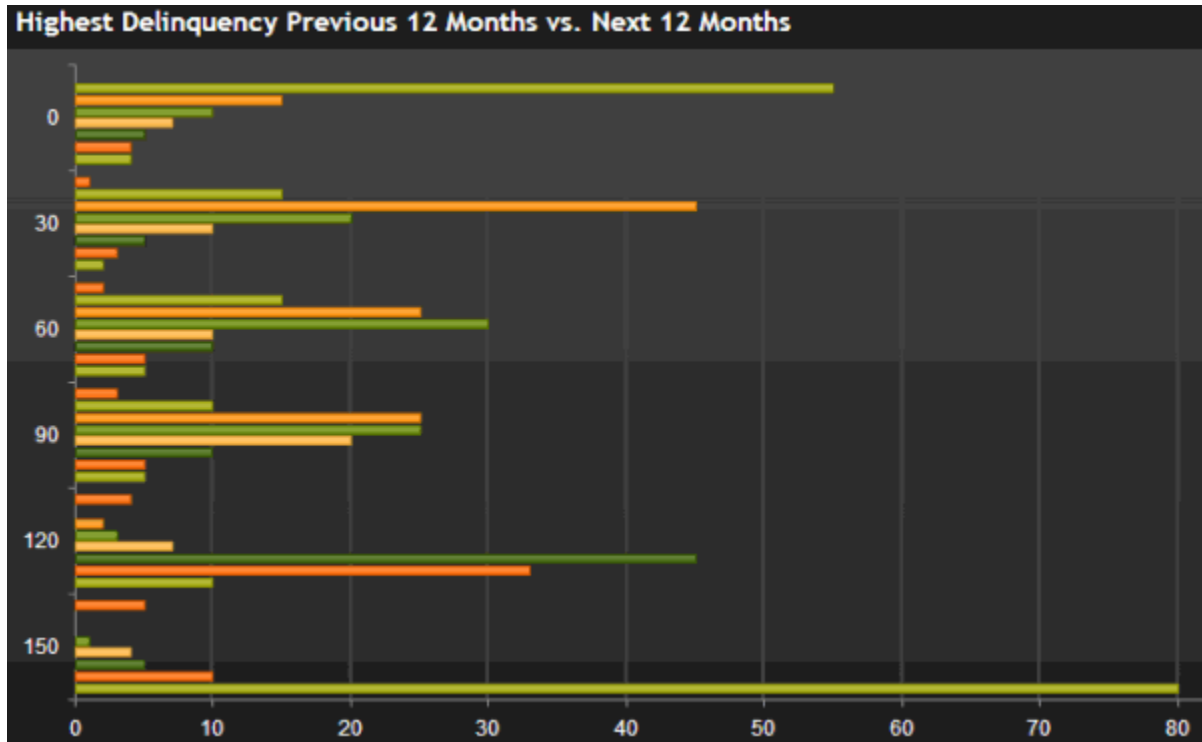
Nested expressions allow you to perform complex searches. For example, queue AND ((collector OR clerical) not supervisor) finds topics containing queue and collector but not supervisor, or containing queue and clerical but not supervisor. As with mathematical expressions, the system evaluates expressions in parentheses first. If there is no parenthesis, the system evaluates the expression from left to right. For example, queue NOT (clerical OR supervisor) finds topics containing queue but not clerical or supervisor. Queue NOT clerical OR supervisor finds topics containing queue but not clerical, or topics containing supervisor.

Dashboard View

Dashboard View

A dashboard displays real-time performance metrics so collectors and managers can analyze collection and performance results. Dashboard presents data using bar charts, data grids, line graphs, pie charts, and text boxes.

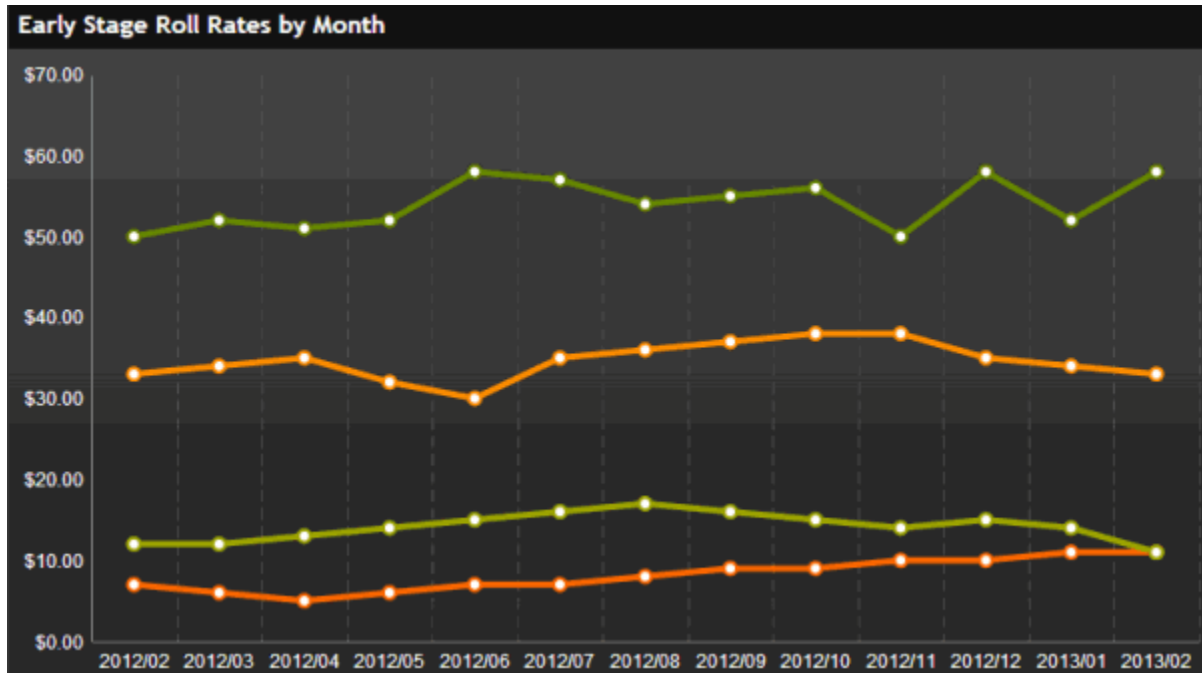

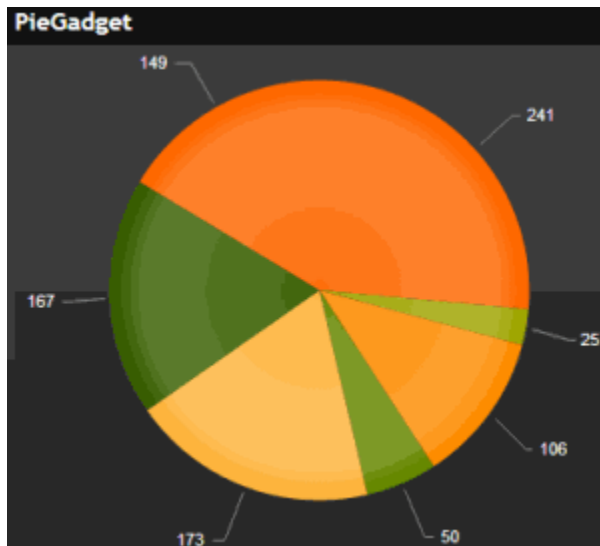

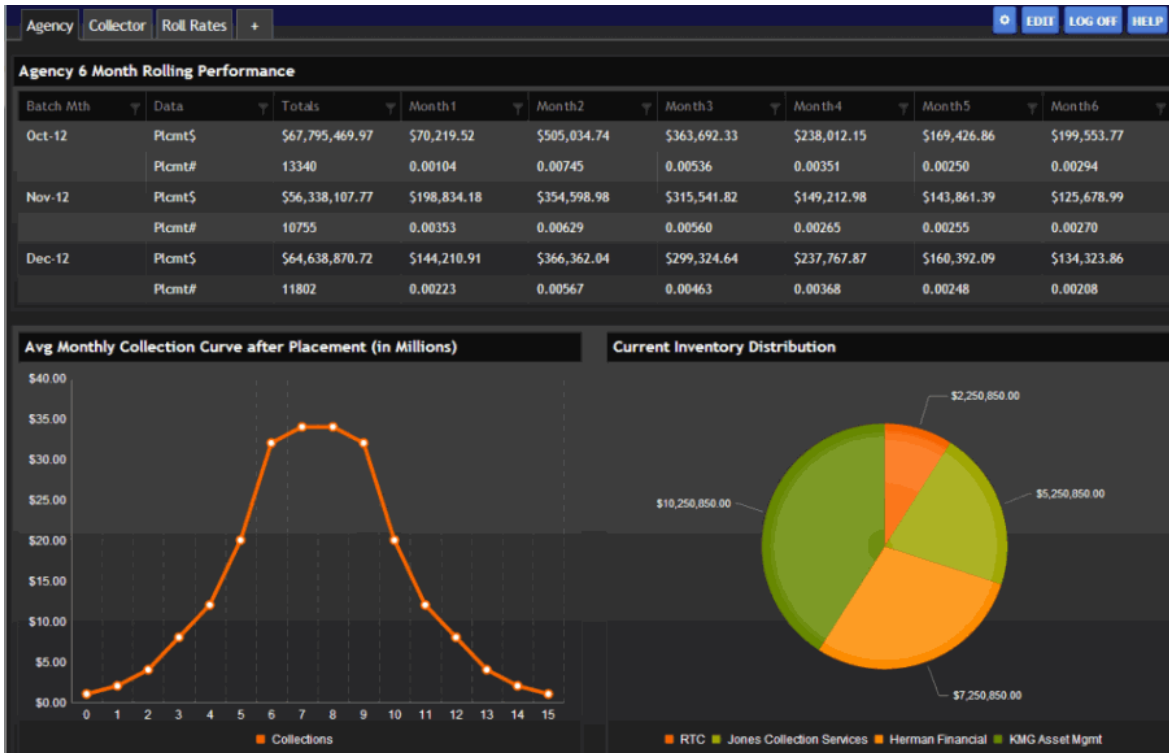


View a Dashboard

Use the tabs in the Dashboard main window to view the dashboards that are available to you. If you have the appropriate permissions, you can create and modify dashboards. For more information, see *Permissions and Policies* in the Latitude documentation.

To view a dashboard

1. In the toolbar, click the tab for the dashboard to display.



2. If the dashboard has a data grid, you may be able to [sort](#), [filter](#), or [page through](#) the data.
3. If the dashboard has a pie chart, bar chart, or line graph that you configured to show tooltips, rest your mouse on an area of the chart or graph to view more information.

Specify a Theme for the Dashboard Main Window

Use the **Dashboard Options** dialog box to specify a color theme for the Dashboard main window.

To specify a theme for the dashboard main window

1. In the toolbar, click the Configuration icon . The **Dashboard Options** dialog box appears.



2. In the **Theme** list box, click a color theme to apply to the dashboard and then click **X**.

Data Grids

Data Grids

A data grid displays information in a table format (rows and columns). If there are no records to display, Dashboard hides the data grid titles and column headings.

Some data grids allow you to:

- [Sort the data](#) in the data grid.

- [Filter the data](#) in the data grid.
- [Page through](#) the data grid.

Sort the Data in a Data Grid

Some data grids allow you to sort the data in the data grid by a single column in ascending or descending order.

To sort data in a data grid

1. Locate the data grid on the Dashboard.

2. Click a column heading to sort the data grid in ascending order by that column.
3. Click the column heading again to sort the data grid in descending order by that column.

Filter the Data in a Data Grid


Some data grids allow you to limit the data that displays in the data grid based on one or more criteria you specify.

To filter data in a data grid

1. Locate the data grid on the Dashboard.

Operator: Operator to use to compare the selected column to a value.

Value: Value to compare to the selected column.

Boolean: Allows you to create a relationship between values.

The following table describes the operators available for filtering a data grid.

Operator	Description	Example
Is Equal To	Displays records that match the value specified.	Month is equal to "October" only displays records where the month is October.

Operator	Description	Example
Is Not Equal To	Displays records that do not match the value specified.	Month is not equal to "October" only displays records where the month is any month except October.
Starts with	Displays records that start with the value specified.	Month starts with "J" only displays records for months that start with the letter J.
Contains	Displays records that contain the value specified.	Month contains "ber" only displays records where the month contains the letters "ber" in that order.
Does not Contain	Displays records that do not contain the value specified.	Month contains "ber" only displays records where the month does not contain the letters "ber" in that order.
Ends with	Displays records that end with the value specified.	Month ends with "Y" only displays records for months that end with the letter Y.
And	Displays records that match both values specified.	Month starts with "J" and month ends with "Y" only displays records for months that start with the letter J and end with the letter Y.
Or	Displays records that match either one of the values specified.	Month is equal to "October" or month is equal to "November" only displays records where the month is October or November.

3. In the **Operator** list box, click the operator.
4. In the **Value** box, type the value to compare.
5. To specify a second expression to evaluate, in the **Boolean** list box, click the Boolean operator and then specify the **Operator** and **Value**.
6. Click **Filter**. Dashboard updates the data grid to reflect the filter criteria. Dashboard only displays the records that meet the specified criteria.

Tip: To remove a filter, click **Clear**.

Page Through a Data Grid

Some data grids allow you to page through the data grid when the number of records exceeds the maximum allowed to display on a page.





To page through a data grid

1. Locate the data grid on the Dashboard.

- To change the maximum number of records that display on a page, click the **Items per page** list box and then click a number.
- To refresh the data grid, click the Refresh icon.

Dashboard Setup

If you have the appropriate permissions, you can create and modify one or more dashboards to display information according to your preference. Each dashboard appears on a separate tab within the

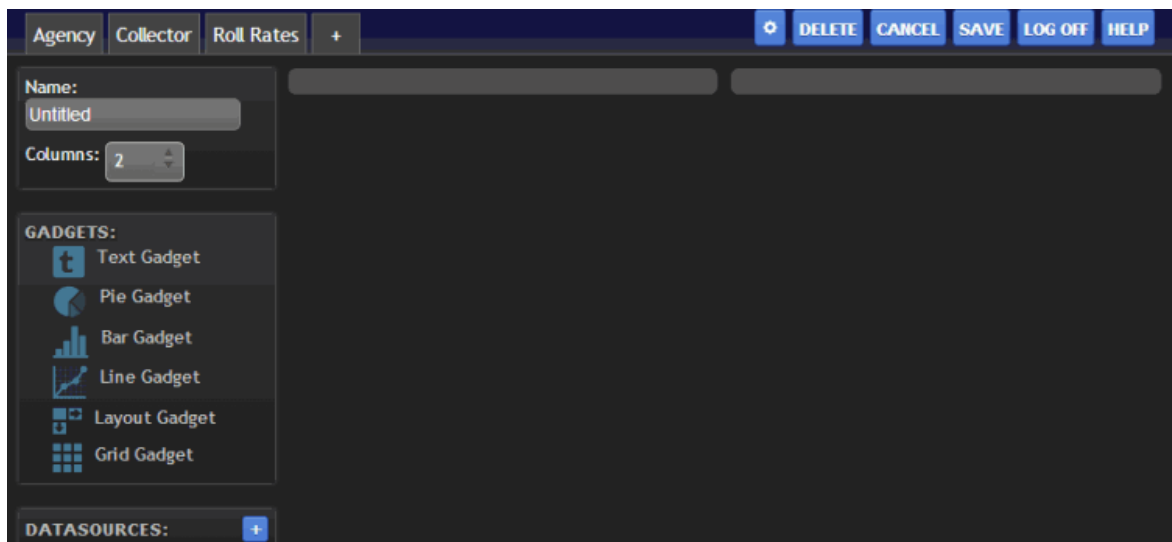
Dashboard main window. For more information about permissions, see *Permissions and Policies* in the Latitude documentation.

Add a Dashboard

You can add a dashboard to appear as a tab in the Dashboard main window. You specify the dashboard's name, the number of columns to display, which gadgets to display and where, the appearance of the gadgets, and what data source each gadget uses.

To add a dashboard

1. In the toolbar, click the plus sign (+) tab. The dashboard displays in add mode.



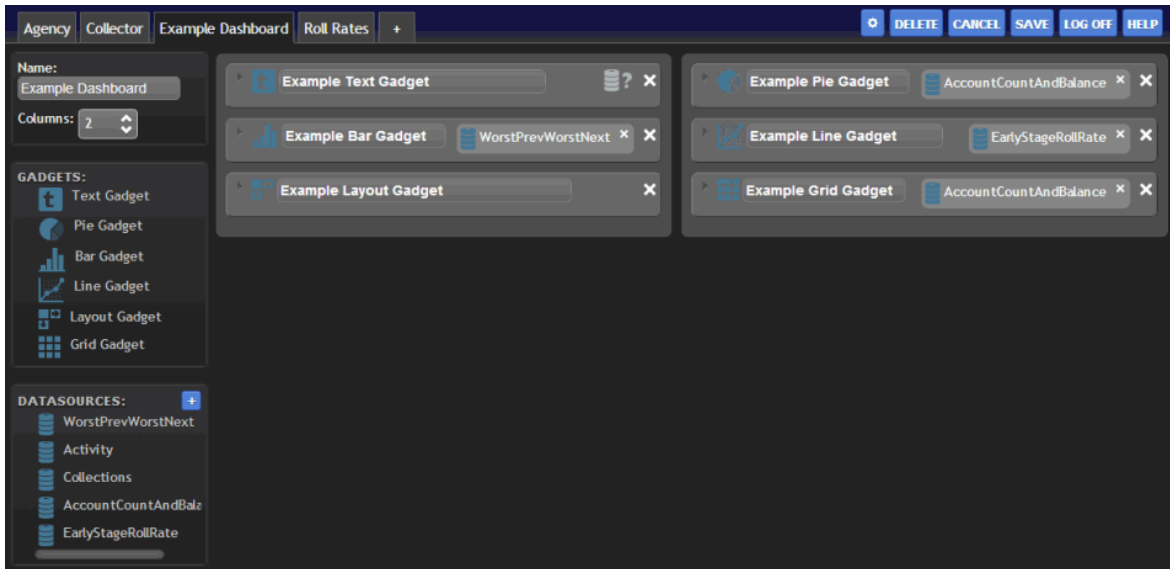
2. In the **Name** box, type a name for the dashboard.
3. In the **Columns** box, type the number of columns to divide the dashboard into or use the arrows to increase or decrease the number. The maximum number of columns allowed is 10.
4. In the **Gadgets** section, click a gadget and drag and drop it to a column on the dashboard.
5. Configure the gadget.
6. Add and configure more gadgets as necessary.
7. In the toolbar, click **Save**.

Modify a Dashboard

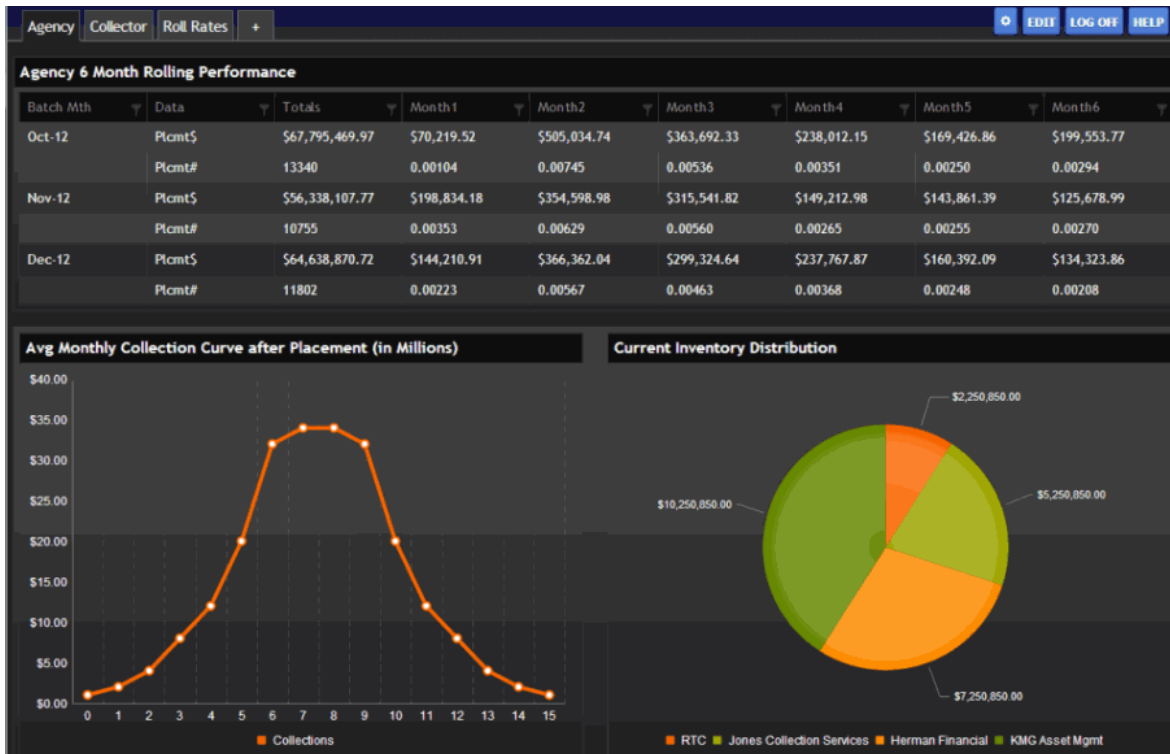
You can modify a dashboard according to your preferences. You can change the name, the number of columns, which gadgets display, where the gadgets display, the appearance of the gadgets, and what data source each gadget uses.

To modify a dashboard

1. In the toolbar, click the tab of the dashboard to open and then click **Edit**. The dashboard appears in edit mode.



2. Modify the dashboard as necessary and then click **Save**. The dashboard appears in view mode.

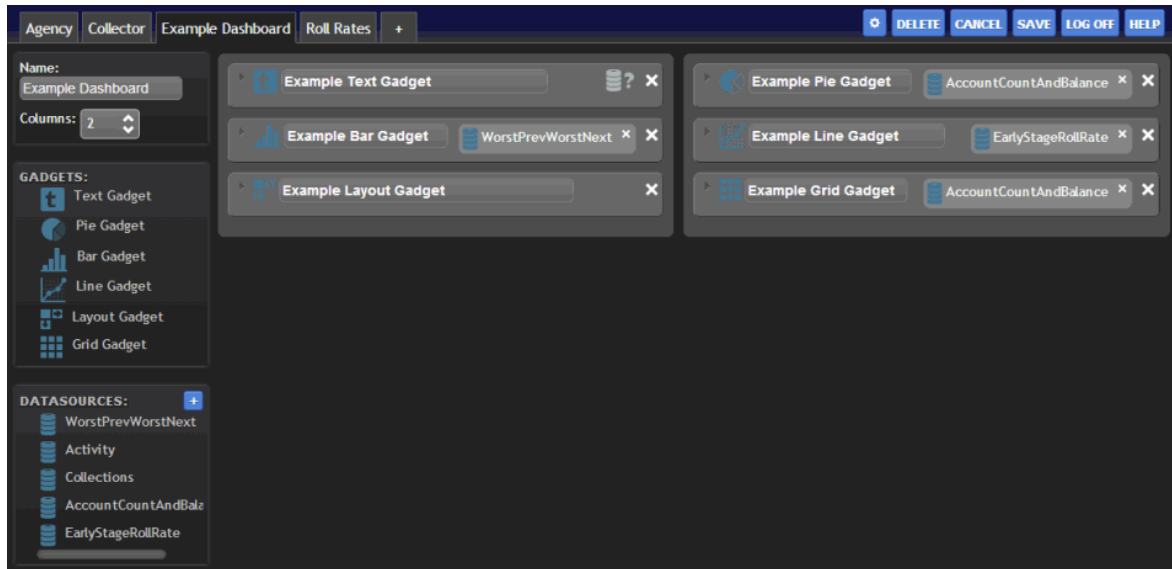


Delete a Dashboard

You can delete any dashboard that you created.

To delete a dashboard

1. In the toolbar, click the tab of the dashboard to open and then click **Edit**. The dashboard appears in edit mode.



2. In the toolbar, click **Delete**.

Data Sources

Data Sources

Data sources retrieve data from the database specified in the connection string in the Dashboard Web.config file. Once you add a data source to Dashboard, you can associate it to a gadget. A gadget displays the data on a dashboard in the form of a bar chart, data grid, line graph, pie chart, or as text.

Variables syntax

Each data source has a table with columns. To use a specific data source column in a dashboard, use one of the following options:

- **\$(Dashboard Name.Source Name.Column Name)** – This format uses the fully qualified name of a column.
- **\$(Source Name.Column Name)** – This format assumes that the source name is unique across the dashboards that are open.
- **\$(Source Name)** – This format also assumes that the source name is unique across the dashboards that are open. Since the data source omits the column name, Dashboard uses the first column.

Global data sources

There are several data sources stored in memory that aren't in the list of data sources available for use with the variables syntax. The built-in global data sources are:

- **\$(UserId)** – Latitude user ID of the logged on user.
- **\$(UserContextType)** – User context type associated to the logged on user. This value is either (the string) "Owner", "Branch", "Department", "Team", or "Desk."
- **\$(UserDesk)** – Desk associated to the logged on user.

- **\$(UserTeam)** – Team associated to the logged on user.
- **\$(UserDepartment)** – Department associated to the logged on user.
- **\$(UserBranch)** – Branch associated to the logged on user.

For example, to display the user name, you can create a raw SQL data source using the following SQL statement:

```
SELECT UserName FROM Users WHERE ID = $(UserId)
```

Note: There is only one column in the UserId data source, so \$(UserId), \$(UserId.UserId), and \$(Global.UserId.UserId) all work, unless you create a data source in your dashboard called UserId.

Raw MDX Data Source

Raw MDX Data Source

The Raw MDX data source allows you to define an MDX query statement to retrieve data from the database specified in the connection string in the Dashboard Web.config file.

The Saved Query data source allows you to specify a saved query to retrieve data from a database you specify. Users create and save these queries using the query tools (such as Account Analysis) in Latitude. For more information about creating and saving a query, see *Create a Query* in the Latitude documentation.

Add a Saved Query Data Source

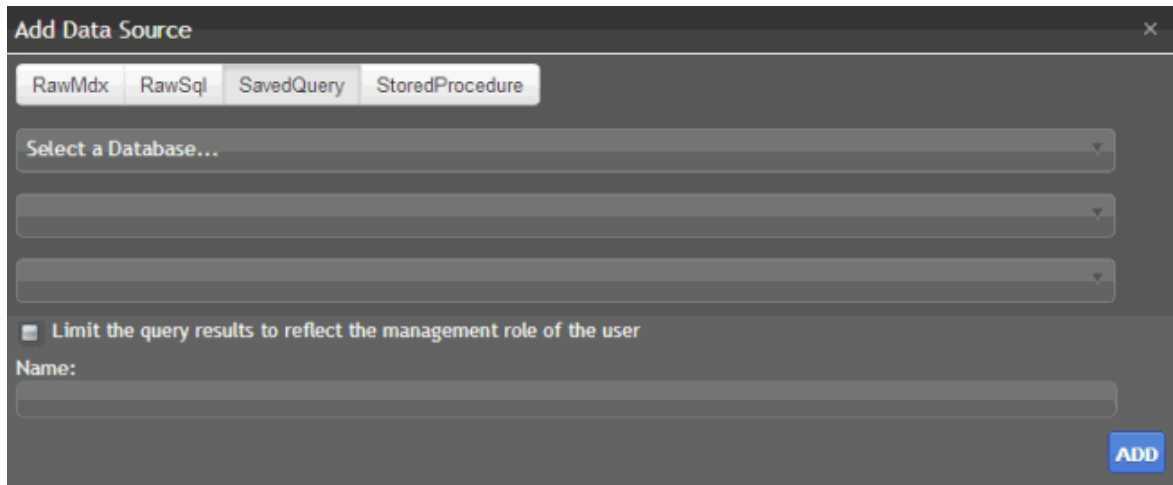
Use the **Add Data Source** dialog box to add a Saved Query data source.

To add a Saved Query data source

1. Do one of the following:
 - To open an existing dashboard, in the toolbar, click the tab of the dashboard to open and then click **Edit**. The dashboard displays in edit mode.
 - To add a dashboard, click the plus sign (+) tab. The dashboard displays in add mode.
2. In the **Data Sources** box, click the plus sign (+).



The **Add Data Source** dialog box appears.



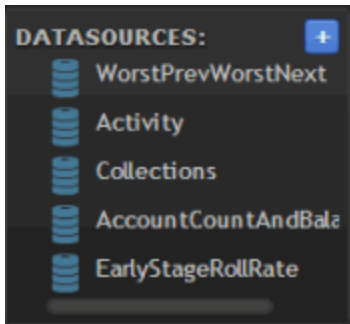
3. In the toolbar, click **SavedQuery**.
4. In the **Select a Database** list box, click the database to query. The "Default" option represents the database specified in the connection string in the Dashboard Web.config file.
5. In the **Select a User** list box, click the user for whom to display saved queries. Dashboard populates the **Select a Saved Query** list box with the queries that the specified user created.
6. In the **Select a Saved Query** list box, click the saved query to use to retrieve data.
7. To limit the query results to reflect the management role of the selected user, select the check box.
8. In the **Name** box, type a name for the data source and then click **Add**. Dashboard adds the Saved Query data source to the **Data Sources** section.

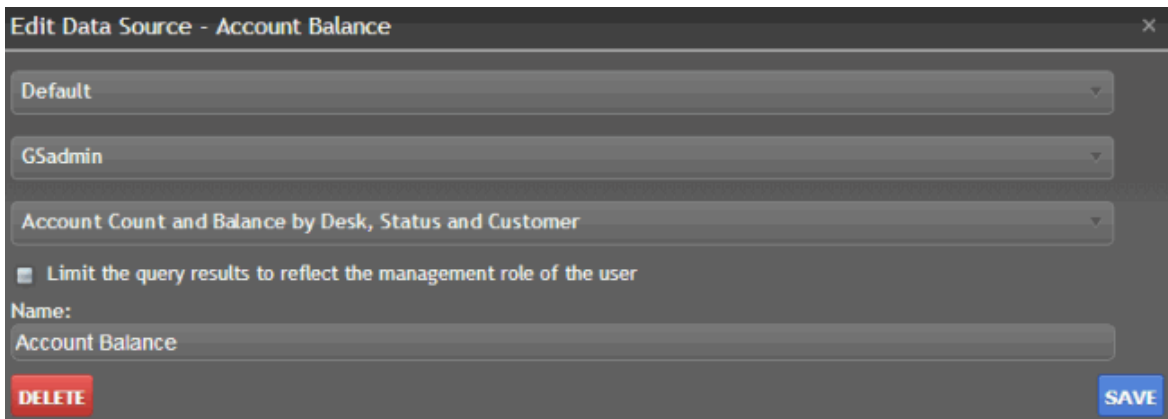

To modify a Saved Query data source

1. Do one of the following:
 - To open an existing dashboard, in the toolbar, click the tab of the dashboard to open and then click **Edit**. The dashboard displays in edit mode.
 - To add a dashboard, click the plus sign (+) tab. The dashboard displays in add mode.
2. In the **Data Sources** box, double-click the data source you set up using a saved query.



The **Edit Data Source** dialog box appears.

Stored Procedure Data Source

The Stored Procedure data source allows you to specify a stored procedure to retrieve data from a database you specify. Only stored procedures that meet one of the following criteria are available:

- The stored procedure accepts no parameters.
- The stored procedure accepts the "@UserContextType" and "@UserContextValue" parameters. If the stored procedure meets the criteria, it passes "@UserContextType" one of the following values, depending on whether the logged on user is an Owner, Branch, Department, Team, or Desk. It passes "@UserContextValue" a value corresponding to the type. For example, if the user is a collector, "@UserContextType" = Desk and "@UserContextValue" = the user's desk code.

If there is more than one value associated with a user context type (for example, the user is the manager of more than one branch,) the value passed to the stored procedure includes all the branch codes separated by "|" characters. The following stored procedure demonstrates this concept:

Good *<i>@timeofday</i>*, @User.Identity.Name</div>

The resulting message that displays to the user is, "Good *afternoon*, Joe Smith." The message breaks down as follows:

"Good" is specific text you typed.

"afternoon" is based on the time of day and has the italic style applied.

"Joe Smith" is based on the logged on user's ID.

Text and data from a data source

The following example shows how to use text and a data source to display a message. This example is for a data source that returns one row of values that includes the user name, last payment amount, and last payment date and time.

\$(Name), your last payment to post was for \$(PaymentAmount) dollars on \$(LastPaymentDateTime).

The resulting message that displays to the user is, "Joe Smith, your last payment to post was for 500 dollars on 2/7/2014 3:00 PM." The message breaks down as follows:

"Joe Smith" is the user ID from the data source.

", your last payment to post was for " is specific text you typed.

"500" is the payment amount from the data source.

" dollars on " is specific text you typed.

"2/7/2014 3:00 PM" is the payment date and time from the data source.

As with the other methods for creating a message, you can use HTML tags to format the message. For example, to apply the bold style to the payment amount, type the following:

```
<b>$(PaymentAmount)</b>
```

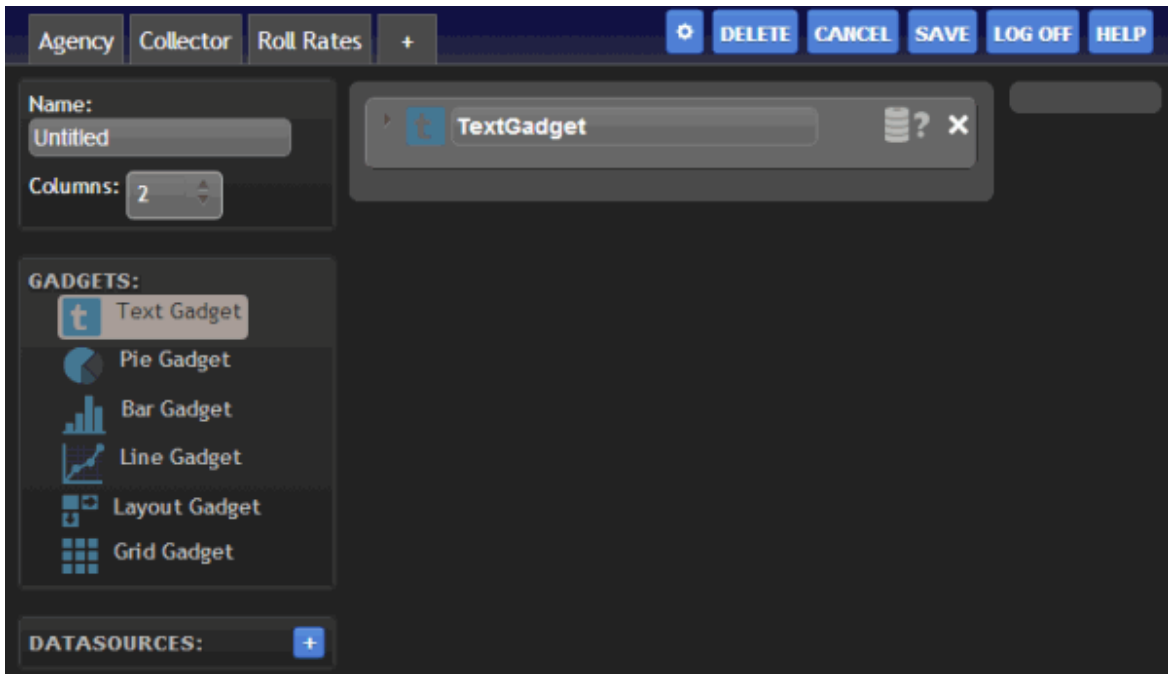
Ensure that you insert punctuation and spaces in the appropriate places so that the text doesn't run together.

Add a Text Gadget to a Dashboard

Use the Text gadget to display custom text on a dashboard.

To add a Text gadget to a dashboard

1. Do one of the following:
 - To open an existing dashboard, in the toolbar, click the tab of the dashboard to open and then click **Edit**. The dashboard displays in edit mode.
 - To add a dashboard, click the plus sign (+) tab. The dashboard displays in add mode.
2. In the **Gadgets** box, click **Text Gadget** and drag it to a dashboard column.
3. Drop the gadget when the plus sign (+) appears.

Configure a Text Gadget

You can configure and apply styles to a Text gadget once it's added to a dashboard. To use a data source with a Text gadget, make sure that you have the data source set up before configuring the gadget. For more information, see the topics under [Data Sources](#).

To configure a Text gadget

1. Click the arrow next to the gadget title. The configuration options appear.



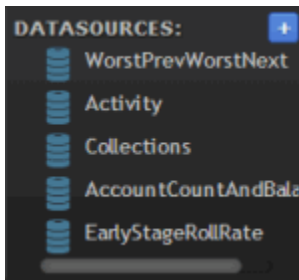
[Title]: Title of the gadget.


[Data Source]: Data source that provides the data to include in the message. If you assigned a data source to the message, the Data Source icon appears. Otherwise, the Data Source title appears.

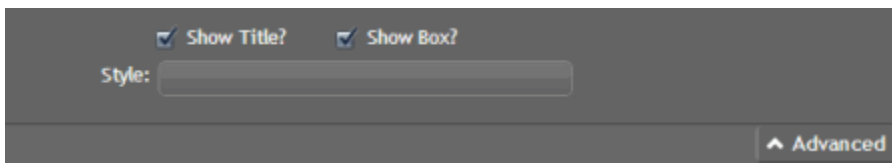
Text: Text, code, or data that creates a message to display to the user. You can type specific text, use code to create the text, use a data source to create the text, or use any combination of the three methods. The system validates the spelling as you type the text and underlines any misspelled words.

Advanced: Shows or hides the advanced configuration options.

2. Double-click **TextGadget** and type a title for the gadget.
3. To include data from a data source, do the following:
 - a. In the **Data Sources** box, click a data source.



- b. Drag the data source onto the Data Source icon  in the Text gadget, and drop it when the plus sign (+) appears. If no data sources exist, see the [Data Sources](#) topics for instructions on adding a specific data source.
4. In the text box, type text, code, data source columns, or any combination thereof to create the message to display to the user. For more information, see [Text Gadget](#).
 5. Click **Advanced**. The advanced options appear.



Show Title: If selected, includes the gadget title when the text displays on the dashboard.

Show Box: If selected, displays a border around the text.

Style: CSS code for the style to apply to the data grid. For example, to display the background of the data grid in red, in the **Style** box, type "background-color:red". To apply multiple styles to the data grid, separate the CSS code with a semi-colon. For example, to display the background of the data grid in red with a solid border, in the **Style** box, type "background-color:red; border-style:solid".

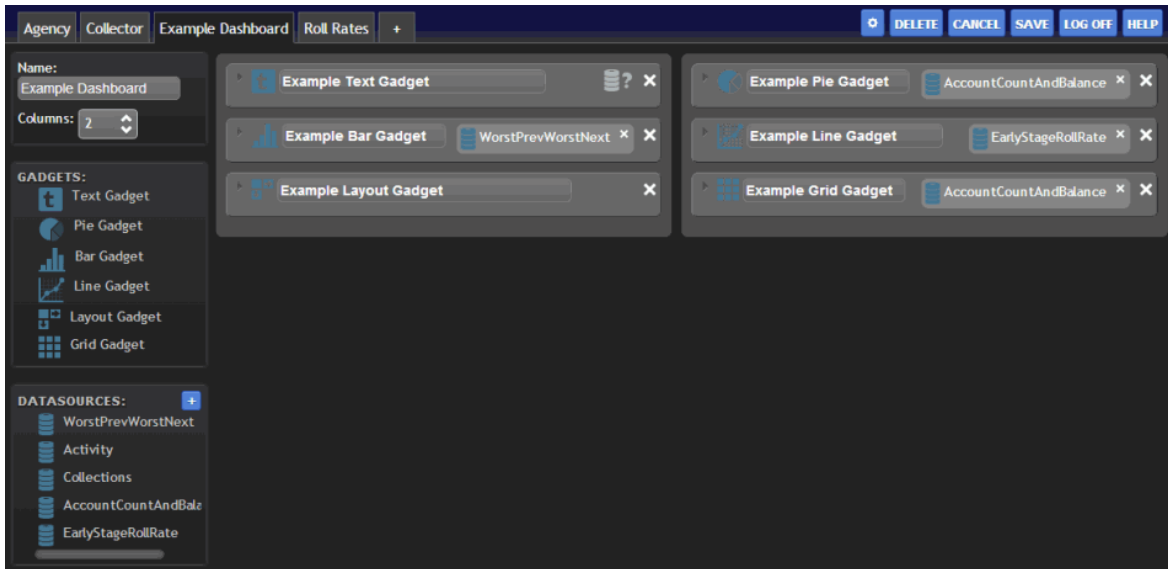

Modify a Text Gadget

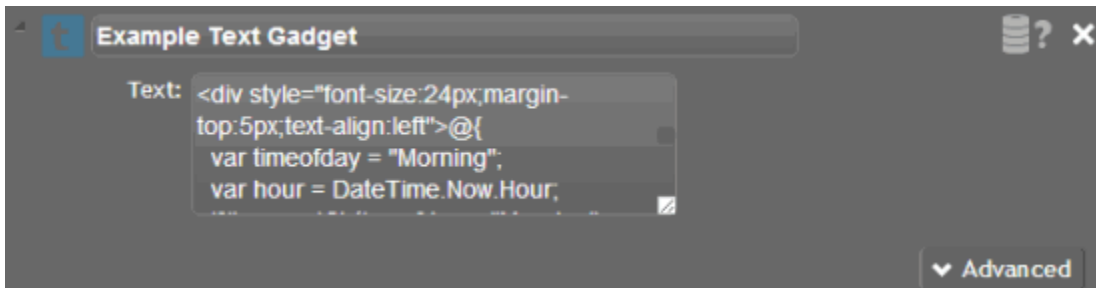
You can modify a Text gadget once it's added to a dashboard.

To modify a Text gadget

1. In the toolbar, click the tab of the dashboard to open and then click **Edit**. The dashboard displays in edit mode.



- Click the arrow next to the Text gadget title. The configuration options appear.



- To change the title of the gadget, select the text in the gadget title box and then type a new title.
- To modify the text, in the text box, type the text to display, or code to create the text to display.
- To move the gadget to a different column of the dashboard, or to change its position within a column, drag and drop it to another column or position.
- To modify advanced options, click **Advanced**, modify the information as necessary, and then click **Save**.
- To delete the gadget from the dashboard, click the **X** in the upper right corner of the gadget.
